## Recent Programs

### 5 October Boys & Girls Club



**Roberto Martinez - Interim CEO Camarillo Boys & Girls Club** opened his speech with a thanks to our very own **Shig Yabu** for making the Camarillo Boys and Girls Club happen. He stressed with much enthusiasm that their goal is to develop children that have confidence that will lead to success. He stated that he feels each child needs these things in order to be successful:

- Expectations that are known for both the child and the B&G Club
- To develop skills that are meaningful
- To be recognized
- To have healthy relationships, both in the home and outside the home

He told us that a one year membership for a child is \$100/year for the 1<sup>st</sup> child and \$60/year for the next child. This membership provides each child with everyday of after school care. Day camp – summers and holidays – is \$15 for the 1<sup>st</sup> child, \$10 for the 2<sup>nd</sup> child and \$5 for each additional child. In addition they ‘never’ have turned away a child of a family that could not afford the care.

A daily after school program looks like this:

- All homework done and checked
- Each child is encouraged to do some physical or learning event such as music, legos, for the engineering skill, cooking, arts and crafts, sports
- A child is sent home with homework done, energy used up and/or a new skill learned
- A child at home is supposed to ready for dinner, bath, family night time activities, and no unnecessary stress added to the child’s and parent’s day

## 19 October Charter School



**Stacey Roth**, a teacher and education specialist with Opportunities For Learning (OFL), presented information about this large charter school. OFL is one of the oldest charter schools in California and now has campuses in several other states. OFL is an independent study charter school for students in middle school and high school. There are classes at the campuses but the work can be done at home or online in some cases. The main focus is “at-risk” children, to assist those that are failing in the traditional school setting with different approaches to the standard schedule. OFL also serves other students where the traditional 5-day school week does not work for them such as actors, dancers, athletes, and children of the same.

These students can enroll at any time of the year. They do their work, turn it in and get credit and can eventually graduate or in some cases return to traditional school. OFL provides advisors and counselors. They provide small group and online instructions. The teachers work one-on-one with the students and develop strong relationships and often times provide a “safe place” for some of the at-risk students. The students can enroll in A-G courses that satisfy requirements for college entrance.

OFL also provides summer school for local area school district students. Many school districts no longer provide summer school. Over 1600 students attended summer school at OFL this past summer.

For Stacey, the most rewarding aspect is the relationships that develop with the students. Many of these students have very difficult lives with little or no support at home. Helping them realize their potential, feel safe and succeed makes it most worthwhile.

**Jim Tancreto** and his wife, **Peg**, shared their March 2014 trip to Capetown, South Africa, the plains of Botswana, Victoria Falls in Zimbabwe, and many other special places in these countries. ## History Is Her Thing

**Megan Gately, Director of Education and Outreach** at the Museum of Ventura County, shared pictures and video shots of many interesting sites, stories, facts and characters from the history of Ventura County. **Megan**, who has both a bachelors and master's degree in history and education from her college days in Arizona, was born in Solvang, CA, and went to Thousand Oaks High School when her mom worked at the local Kinkos. Before signing on at the Museum of Ventura County, she had a few short stints teaching high school math and history in Arizona and doing museum work in Minnesota.

Among other historical facts about the San Buenaventura Mission (the 9th built in California), she noted that the bells at the Mission were made out of wood because metal bells were too expensive. She singled out **Padre Juan Comapla**, who supported the Chumash natives and cared for the Church faithful in Ventura, for the many contributions he made to preserving and cleaning up the Mission during the years it was transitioning from a small Spanish community to become the City of Ventura. **Megan** invited all the Optimists and friends present to come to the Museum of Ventura County as a group or individually to enjoy some of the upcoming special programs. ## 16 November Can't Is Not In My Vocabulary



**Marilyn Takahashi Fordney** (now Mrs. **Sandor Havasi** since Nov. 2004) shared some of her growing up and learning experiences as a Japanese-American in California. Though we had expected that her talk would be largely on her experience as a Japanese internee in WW II, she barely mentioned that. Marilyn began taking ballet and tap dance lessons at the age of 12 and joined a summer dance troupe. Her interest in dance was interrupted when her high school years and career headed toward the medical assisting field where she performed administrative and clinical duties for 14 years. She taught college and adult education

courses for 19 years, and in 1979 became a Certified Medical Transcriptionist. Her experience qualified her to author or co-author more than 70 books on Administrative Medical Assisting and related subjects! Things did not always go smoothly in her life. Shortly after getting married to her first husband, her home burned down destroying all her possessions—front page news of the L.A. Times—in September 1970. Even though her career kept her very busy working in the medical administrative field teaching and writing, she never gave up her dream of dancing. In 2002 she began to dance competitively in International and American pro-am ballroom dances, and in May of that year she established the Fordney Foundation for DanceSport for amateur youths, ages 6 to 25. As if establishing one foundation was not enough, in 2008, Marilyn and her husband Sandor started the Havasi Wilderness Foundation (website: [www.havasiwf.org](http://www.havasiwf.org)) to educate the public with respect to the importance of protecting and preserving nature and our ecosystems. This program has made it possible for thousands of children and disadvantaged adults to visit state or national parks to learn about nature and find pleasure in a healthier lifestyle.



To help set the mood for Marilyn's WWII era life, Shig Yabu invited Tom Kuznkowski back to our meeting (We enjoyed his ukelele and mini-banjo playing last November, too, when was the presenter.) to play and sing classics like "Don't Fence Me In" and "You Are My Sunshine," among others. A good sing along was enjoyed by all..
