May 16 - Financial Planning

Eric Smith, CFP, Lifetime Planning, Inc., a certified financial consultant and attorney, shared several estate planning tips with Optimist Club members and friends. He noted four mistakes people make with their estates: 1. failing to plan; 2. not looking at details carefully; 3. not checking up periodically or fine tuning documents; and 4. failing to communicate or letting others know where documents are and informing them of their responsibilities. He specifically emphasized the importance of having an up to date trust, a durable power of attorney, an advanced healthcare directive, long-term care coverage, among other documents and coverages in place for wise planners.

Eric stressed that his company's first priority is overall financial success. His website—www.lifetimeplanning.biz—has educational videos, articles, presentations, and calculators designed to help clients learn more about the world of personal finance. He encourages interested parties to send him a note regarding any questions about investment concepts or products, and he will get back to you quickly with a thoughtful answer.

The GCU speakers shared information about their Arizona based Christian University in Phoenix. They noted that the 15,000 student school has 70% living on campus and is dedicated to maintaining a vibrant community committed to building global citizens, critical thinkers, effective communicators and responsible leaders by providing an academically challenging, values-based curriculum from the context of their Christian heritage.

In the summer of 2014 GCU opened its College of Science, Engineering and Technology, and they plan to add degree programs in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). A GCU Hotel is located close to campus and offers affordable room rates and newly renovated accommodations for families visiting their student. Students in GCU's hospitality management program have an opportunity to gain firsthand experience at the hotel and restaurant, which will open in 2016.

In early 2016, GCU opened the GCU Golf Course. In addition to a new clubhouse with restaurant, pro shop and luxury event space, the course features a new design, expansive turf and lush greens. The course is home to GCU's NCAA Division I men's and women's golf teams, and students in the golf management program.
